# UNITED NATIONS GENERAL ASSEMBLY - DISEC (DISARMAMENT AND INTERNATIONAL SECURITY)

AGENDA: ADDRESSING THE PROLIFERATION OF AUTONOMOUS WEAPONS SYSTEMS WITH A SPECIAL EMPHASIS ON ENSURING HUMAN ACCOUNTABILITY IN WARFARE.



DISEC is the First Committee of the UN General Assembly. It holds a universal mandate, with all 193 UN member states represented, to address the most critical issues of international peace and security. This committee deals with all matters of disarmament, arms control, and non-proliferation, from nuclear weapons and weapons of mass destruction to the regulation of conventional arms and emerging military technologies.

As our largest committee, DISEC is the cornerstone of multilateral diplomacy, offering a fantastic forum for both new and experienced delegates to engage in large-scale debate, draft comprehensive resolutions, and navigate the complexities of global security policy.

### UNITED NATIONS HUMAN RIGHTS COUNCIL (UNHRC)

AGENDA: ADDRESSING HUMAN RIGHTS VIOLATIONS IN THE SAHEL REGION WHILE EXAMINING THE ACTIONS OF STATE AND NON-STATE ACTORS IN LIGHT OF INTERNATIONAL LEGAL FRAMEWORKS



The UNHRC is the principal inter-governmental body within the United Nations system responsible for strengthening the promotion and protection of all human rights around the globe. Comprising 47 member states, this committee has the authority to investigate allegations of human rights breaches, make recommendations, and dispatch fact-finding missions.

Delegates in the UNHRC will be plunged into the heart of moral and legal debates, tackling pressing issues of human dignity, systemic injustice, and the protection of fundamental freedoms in a world where they are constantly under threat.

### UNITED NATIONS COMMISSION ON THE STATUS OF WOMEN (UNCSW)

AGENDA: STRENGTHENING GLOBAL ACTION AGAINST GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE WITH A SPECIAL EMPHASIS ON ONLINE HARASSMENT OF WOMEN AND GIRLS.



The UNCSW is the premier global intergovernmental body exclusively dedicated to the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of women. As a functional commission of the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), the UNCSW is instrumental in setting global standards and formulating concrete policies to protect women's rights and realities worldwide.

Delegates will have the critical task of examining systemic discrimination, violence against women, and barriers to equality, with the goal of creating robust legal and social frameworks to ensure a more just and equitable world for all.

### UNITED NATIONS ENVIRONMENT PROGRAMME (UNEP)

AGENDA: STRENGTHENING GLOBAL LEGAL FRAMEWORKS ON CHEMICAL AND HAZARDOUS WASTE MANAGEMENT



This committee is perfect for delegates passionate about international environmental law and sustainable development.

#### NATIONAL SECURITY COUNCIL (NSC)

This is the ultimate test of diplomacy, strategy, and adaptability. The CCC is a small, fast-paced committee designed for experienced delegates who thrive under pressure. Unlike conventional committees, the agenda is classified, and the simulation is driven by real-time crisis updates. Delegates will not represent nations but rather individual figures within a specific cabinet, council, or historical body.

You will be forced to react to assassinations, military invasions, natural disasters, or political coups at a moment's notice, using personal directives and committee-wide communiques to shape events as they unfold.

### INTERNATIONAL PRESS CORPS (ICP)

AGENDA: RECRUITING JOURNALIST, PHOTOGRAPHERS AND CARICATURISTS



The IPC is the eyes, ears, and voice of the conference. More than just observers, members of the press are active participants who hold delegates and committees accountable. As a Journalist, you will investigate leads, conduct interviews, write breaking news articles, and publish editorials.
